You must open your heart and let them in if you want them to open their heart and let you in.
	160-189	BF felt that the success of his restaurant business was just good luck. BF was lucky enough to have good personnel to execute his policies. In order to be successful in America, you first have to serve the needs of the whites and to serve the needs of yourself. In other words to use American ways to serve what Americans want is the key to success.
6	190-216	BF thinks that every Chinese does feel more Chinese. BF felt more Chinese but lived more like Americans. BF thinks the Chinese way has more wisdom.
