	242-252	The Chinese in Canada at that time felt very close to the people in China. Some of them sent money back to China. LF's husband would send money back to his own mother. His brother would spend all the money instead of giving it to his mother.
	253-264	During the Depression, the Chinese did not make much money.
	265-267	LF did not feel that there was hostility towards the Chinese.
	268–285	LF's happiest years were those years that she worked for F. See On. H <sup>e</sup> gave her more pay. That was around 1939. LF's hardest times was when she had her daughter, Pat. LF did not have enough money to pay the doctor's bill. Pat is not LF's oldest daughter, her oldest daughter is Lucille.

	295-299	LF does not mind having daughters instead of sons.
	300-312	LF does not approve of interracial marriages. LF's cousin married an American. Those marriages do not last long.
	313-319	LF does not know of anyone who returned to China. LF would not like to go back to China. She does not know anyone over there.
	320-331	LF does not mind the stereotypical portrayals of Chinese in movies. LF's own father had a pigtail.
